

Top tips to help your child with reading...


- 1. Let your child see you read.
- 2. Visit the local library together Maidenhead Library.
- 3. Read the book before you see the film! Discuss which one you preferred and why.
- 4. Have a regular routine of when and where you read with your child, try to get aside at least 20 minutes each day.
- 5. Play appropriate word and reading games on a computer or tablet.

 Topmarks --> English Games --> 3-5 year olds / 5-7 year olds / 7-11 year olds
- 6. Ask your child questions about what they are reading. Check our termly newsletter for a new reading strategy each term.
- 7. Encourage your child to write thank you letters, postcards, diaries, etc.
- 8. Ask your child to draw comic strips based on their favourite book.
- 9. Read a wide variety of genres including: comics, cook books, non-fiction texts, chapter books, poems, autobiographies, etc.
- 10. Check to see what book/s your child is reading in class. Discuss the theme and book with your child and read other books relating to the topic.

Advice and tips from Little Wandle...

Does it matter how we read with our children?



Studies show that it's the enjoyment and chat that matters!

The more you chat together about the book and things that interest your child, the more impact it has.

You don't even have to read the words on the page – talking about the pictures is just as important.

If you can read the words, then use your voice to make them come alive. It will help your child understand the book even better.



Reading strategy...Prediction



Prediction is using evidence from a text to say what may happen next, what events may unfold or how a character may behave.

Prediction questions you could ask your child when they are reading.

Who is on the front cover? What is in the background? How might these details give us clues to the content of this book?

What might happen if?

Where do you think will go next, why?

How do you think this will end?


















Author Spotlight...


Dear Mrs Goodson-Smith,

Olá! I'm Jasmina Santos-Campbell (but you can call me Jaz). You've probably heard of me and


my football team the Bramrock Stars before. No? Well, you will soon because we're almost famous!




Rocky of the Rovers by Tom Palmer

Now it's up to Rocky to find her own way as a person and a player and she's going to need all her grit and determination to do it...






Saka by Matt and Tom Oldfield






KS2 Book Club...
