

# Reading strategy...Inference



**Inference** is making an inference involves using what you know to make a guess about what you don't know or reading between the lines. Readers who make **inferences** use the clues in the text along with their own experiences to help them figure out what is not directly said, making the text personal and memorable.

Inference questions you could ask your child when they are reading.

What do you think the author meant when.....?

What effect did the author want to create by......?

What do you think ...... is saying/thinking/feeling at this point? Why?



### Advice and tips from Little Wandle...

# What if they always want to read the same book?

Repeated reading of books is really beneficial for children. It helps them memorise parts of stories, words and phrases too.

Knowing a book or poem by heart is fun and powerful for children, they can 'read' the story with you, or join in with words of phrases.

If you really want to mix it up, offer another book alongside the much-loved favourite!



## Does it matter which language we use?

#### Use your home language.

It is better for your child to hear expert talk from you in your language.

Many studies tell us it is the back-and-forth talk between adults and children when they are sharing books that makes the difference to children's language and comprehension.

This impact will translate to better language and comprehension for your child in English.







# Snuggle up with a book...

### Ingredients

250ml milk of your choice

1 tbsp cocoa

1-2 tbsp soft light brown sugar

25g dark or plain chocolate, finely chopped, plus a grating to serve

1 tbsp whipped cream or squirty cream

#### Method

#### STEP 1

Heat the milk, cocoa, sugar and chocolate in a small <u>pan</u> over a medium heat until steaming and the chocolate has melted. Whisk to dissolve the cocoa.

#### STEP 2

Pour into a mug, then add the cream to float on top. Grate over a little more chocolate to serve.



This term Year 2 will be using *Dear Earth* by **Isabel Otter** in their English lessons. Over the summer holidays I wrote to Isabel, this was her reply... My name is Isabel Otter and I'm a children's book editor and writer. Ever since I was a little girl, I have always loved writing stories. The wonderful thing about stories is that they can be about absolutely anything. I still have a copy of the first story I ever wrote, aged five. It was called 'How I Get Dressed' and described how first I would put my socks on my ears, then my trousers on my arms, my shirt on my head and so on! Even an everyday routine can be used as story material if you give it a little twist!


My second picture book, Dear Earth, illustrated by Clara Anganuzzi, is about a girl called Tessa who starts writing a love letter to the Earth and gets whirled away to the places that she writes about. It's easy to feel powerless when we hear news about global warming. I felt inspired to write this story because I wanted to explore an imaginative way to engage with the climate crisis, without making readers feel that it is in any way their fault or their responsibility to sort out. There can be great power in sharing information and messages of hope, and it's a way for everybody to join in regardless of their age or where they live.

This term Year 6 will be using *Everest* by **Alexandra Stevens** in their English lessons. Over the summer holidays I wrote to Alexandra, this was her reply... *Dear Oldfield Primary School*,

I am so honoured that you are reading Everest this term. Whilst researching the book, back in 2017, I found myself transported far away from the cosy London café where I sat and worked, to the majestic snowy peaks of the Himalayas. It was a thrilling adventure and one I hope you will enjoy too when you read about Ed Hillary and Tenzing Norgay's journey to the top of Everest. My top tip would be to ask your teacher to show you photographs and film reel from the 1953 expedition - which are all online. Then take a look at some pictures and footage of people climbing Everest today. After seeing them you'll really get a feel for the mind-boggling challenges that the team of 1953 faced. They were brave and determined people.

People sometimes ask me about how to become a writer. I think the two most important things are: firstly, to read widely and read a lot. Reading lots of different things helps us learn about all the wonderful ways people use language. What's more, whilst we read, we absorb knowledge, thoughts and ideas that can help us with our own writing. Secondly, and very obviously, it's important to write! If you write a little something every day – even if it's a short diary entry – you'll get into the habit of writing. You'll become more confident and you'll start to try out new ways of expressing your own thoughts and ideas!




#### **Uncle Bobby's Wedding by Sarah Brannen**

#### Fred gets dressed by Peter Brown








# Me, my Dad and the end of the rainbow by Benjamin Dean




#### Pink is for boys by Robb Pearlman


### Julian is a Mermaid by Jessica Love
